In the late 1960s, Derry's doughtiest heritage campaigner, architect Joe Tracey, set about recording what remained. Passionate about Derry's old buildings, he founded the Foyle Civic Trust [FCT] in 1989. For a quarter century, FCT presented the case for heritage in the north west – even when none listened.

In 1999, Heritage Lottery Fund [HLF] launched the Townscape Heritage Initiative (THI) – a UK-wide repair grant scheme available to owners of selected old buildingsin economically deprived areas.

Seizing the moment, FCT's Chair Mary McLaughlin, and City Centre Initiative's first Chief Executive, Cliodhna Mulhern, fostered buy-in from key statutory bodies to form the Walled City Partnership [WCP]. Established in June 2002, this enduring marriage between Foyle

Civic Trust, Derry City Council and City Centre Initiative is supported by Department for Social Development, Planning NI and Northern Ireland Housing Executive.

The WCP application to
HLF for a £1 million THI building repair scheme – targeting
clusters of old buildings in
Waterloo Street, Magazine
Street, Shipquay Street and
Castle Street – received permission to start in February
2003.

A decade on, Walled City Partnership delivers Northern Ireland's largest, most successful THI. Led from the outset by, energetic and committed Chair, Mary McLaughlin, the WCP team has overseen the rescue and repair of 25 old buildings and initiated Northern Ireland's first dedicated THI education programme.
